David Brainerd was a young man who lived and breathed missions. He felt God's call to share the gospel with the Native Americans. Brainerd was in his twenties, just beginning life. But he packed up his things, left behind friends and family, and went on his own to the mission field. He did not care about enjoying the comforts of life or gaining wealth and popularity. He had dedicated himself to the cause and desired to labor faithfully for Christ.

On the mission field (places we know today as New York, Pennsylvania, and New Jersey), Brainerd did not find it easy to make friends. His eating habits and even the places he slept were unclean and uncomfortable. However, this did not cause him to give up. He stayed focused on the goal—to minister to the American Indians.

Unfortunately, Brainerd's time on the mission field was not long. He developed a disease called tuberculosis, and it eventually took his life at the age of



twenty-nine. Sadly, before his death he was discouraged. He felt he had not grown a successful ministry. He felt his work left more to be desired. However, he is remembered for being a devoted, determined missionary. Many missionaries still remember his great work there among the Native Americans.




As God helps us keep our priorities straight, He will use us to make a spiritual difference in people's lives. We can bless others just like David Brainerd helped many Native American Indians.

DAVID BRAINERD A LIFE OF INFLUENCE

Henry Martin was a missionary to the Muslims. He stated in his writings that it was Brainerd's devotedness that gave him the ability to push forward in his missions work.

You never know who is watching your life. David Brainerd had no idea what kind of an influence he was having on others, but it paid off eternally! Give your best to God, and whenever the devil comes and tries to discourage you, remember others are watching. It is never the right time to give up!
