Dear Friends,

Greetings from the Peterson family. Over the past few months our hearts have been deeply touched by your prayers and support during this time of transition. Moving from Lesotho, Africa, back to the United States was difficult. We have been loved and received graciously by the Basotho people. But after seven years of missionary service with Hope International Missions, we knew it was time to return home as our children are stepping into the next phase of life, and we need to be there to support them.

In 2015 when God began to stir our hearts for ministry, specifically orphan ministry, we did not know what that would look like. Yet today we can scan over the years and see God was with us each step of the way. Our time in Lesotho and the ministries we were involved in there have been some of the most significant years of our lives. We have learned you can love two places and people at once. Lifelong friends have been made, and we are humbled that God let us be a part in building His kingdom in Africa.

Serving in Lesotho with the OVC Ministry has been a great privilege. In the past six years a community-based ministry that assists orphans and vulnerable children has been established. Through this program eighty-two children have received help in fifteen different villages. A dedicated OVC committee, alongside Sister Itumeleng and Pastor Kali, are continuing to further the work. We will still help with the sponsorship program and give direction as needed.

Another ministry we began in Lesotho was the Eternal Foundations Project. One of the challenges missionaries face in a developing country is establishing a reliable fund for the mission to become self-sustaining. We realized the village of Matukeng was a prime location for beginning such a project. Because it is near the capital city, there is a high demand for housing. Our village was the perfect place for building a small rental community that could support the local churches. Rental income from the first home has already significantly impacted the church's finances; the available funds will grow with the completion of the second house in early 2025.

A church tabernacle was also built on the property. It is used each Sunday for Matukeng church services and hosts multiple conferences throughout the year. During our second term, a new church in the village of Ha Ratau was built. These four building projects kept Wes very busy, yet seeing it all take shape was exciting. Relationship bridges have been built through the laborers who helped and through hosting work teams. We thank everyone who prayed and gave to these buildings over the years. Please keep praying that the financial foundations laid will continue to grow and be a blessing to the churches in Lesotho.

The Lord has directed our steps these last seven years. In the months leading up to our departure, I began to reflect on our time in Lesotho. As I listed things God had taught and shown me, I was overwhelmed and encouraged to see all the blessings He had given us.

As we said our goodbyes to a place we deeply loved and called home and gave our last hugs to the people we had served, we were at peace. It was not easy, but our time in Africa was worth it. Our family would do it again in a heartbeat. Please pray for the ministries we left behind as they continue forward. We ask that you also pray for the missionary team serving in southern Africa. They became our family, and we miss them dearly. Pray they will continue to be effective in making disciples for the sake of the gospel. The harvest field is still ripe. Much work still needs to be done, and more laborers are still needed in Lesotho and South Africa.

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
