I think the moments that touched me most deeply were holding newborn Lindelani at the Matukeng clinic, singing with Miss Angela's preschoolers, packing school supplies for needy children with the Petersons, meeting the radiant Malashoane, hearing from young people who have been changed by Reach4Life, and watching Pastor Allegri teach in Zambia. Wow! I have come home challenged to see what I can do to share Christ wherever I go.

I came back with a full heart and a desire to visit Africa again someday. I am grateful for the gospel, good teachers, easy access to Bibles, and my home, family, and friends. I hope you have enjoyed this journey to Africa as much as I have. Please keep the people of Africa in your prayers. Our awesome God is at work all the time both here and in Africa—and everywhere else!




